### **What does safety and security mean to you?**

In our conversations with the neighbourhood, it has become clear that the right to housing plays an important role in the feeling of protection, security and freedom.

There is one ticket we should always have with us. Namely a key.

If you don't have a key with you or don't use it any more, imagine a bunch of keys that accompanies you in everyday life. Which keys would be on this bunch?

Take a close look at the individual keys on the bunch. How many different keys are there?

The keys give you access to certain rooms and goods. They also give you rights.

For example, which of the keys gives you the right of entry? Which key gives you the right to have a say, for example, to express your opinion freely? Do you have a key for a lock to which only you have access?

Whether front door, flat, office or bicycle keys: we take the keys on our key ring with us everywhere and we are afraid of losing them. They describe our everyday life and the rights that are granted to us as a person.

How does your personal key ring describe you as a person, your activity, your commitment or your relationship with others? What form of security and freedom do the keys offer you in everyday life?
